News from "The Squadron" and Around the Branches

"The Squadron"

Since The Squadron returned from a very successful tour of Northern Ireland, a short spell of leave was taken over the Easter period, with everyone returning to Aldershot by the 9th April 1996. It had been some two and half years since The Squadron as a whole had worked with 5 Airborne Brigade. Construction tasks had taken up most of the time, so we wished to make sure our Infantry and Combat Engineer skills were brought back to our normal high standard. The Training Officer was tasked to produce an intensive programme, incorporating all the soldiering and sapper disciplines. Many long hours of "wheeling & dealing" followed, which paid off, with all troops enjoying an exhausting but very rewarding three week training package.

Subsequently, The Squadron deployed on Exercise "Purple Star" for one month, which was an overseas airborne exercise with 5 Airborne Brigade in America. One hundred & twenty three (123) members of the Squadron flew to Fort Bragg, North Carolina, home of 82 Airborne Division, for cross training and field exercises. The Squadron was hosted by 'C' Company, 37 Battalion, who are part of 20 Engineer Brigade. Worthy of note, the Americans have an Airborne Corps, where we have a Brigade, also having a Brigade of Airborne Engineers, where we have a Squadron! We were not daunted, as none of them had passed 'P' Company!

We enjoyed a tremendous ten day training package on their backdoor training area, which seemed the size of Hampshire! They demonstrated several improvised charges on the demolition range and some of their impressive "scatterable" mine laying equipment. They also held copious quantities of plant, most of which can be air dropped and are experts in runway construction and maintenance. We also parachuted with the "notorious" T10-C parachute, more of which later!

The whole Squadron was awarded American "Blood Wings" - "thumped" into the chest by the presenting officer! The Officer Commanding had the dubious honour of having his wings knocked into his chest by an "overzealous" American "Bird" Colonel, with a 20-pound mallet on the end of a broom handle!

Following the cross training and hard earned rugby victory, which was achieved on a pitch resembling a gravel pit, The Squadron deployed to their forward mounting base. This was at Cherry Point, near the US Marine Base at Camp Lejeune. After two days battle preparation, the Squadron deployed in support of the Brigade, to secure a lodgement in support of 3 Commando Brigades' amphibious landings. Unfortunately, two American helicopters collided on the first night, killing 17 US Marines and the exercise was understandably curtailed. Nonetheless, we had completed most of our tasks. The second phase was the highlight of the tour, with the fourth largest parachute drop in history. The Squadron, with a company of American Engineers under command, parachuted at night onto one of five Brigade Drop Zones used in the Fort Bragg area. The exercise went to plan, except Sapper Allen Craven who experienced double parachute malfunction. Miraculously he survived, but is currently in hospital in North Carolina with many breaks, including a broken pelvis. Unfortunately, his was not the only malfunction that evening.

Our main effort was to construct and maintain a Hercules C130 landing strip. Members of Support Troop gained tremendous experience and acquired vital skills in this role. These skills will be required to carry out similar work, in our new Joint Rapid Deployment Force role.

In summary the exercise was a tremendous success and it proved an excellent opportunity to soldier again, following our three recent construction tours in the last two years. For the remainder of the calendar year. The Squadron will deploy troops to Cyprus, Canada, Bosnia and Belize, before our training exercises in Kenya at the end of the year Morale is extremely high and the men look forward to seeing Association Members at Airborne Forces Day!

Aldershot Branch

The change of meeting day from Friday evening to Sunday lunch has been a great success. Our first meeting attracted fifty members with families, guests and friends, all of whom attended the lunch. The lunch was held in the 5 Brigade Sergeants Mess dining room and full bar facilities were available. Three course lunch with wine available at extra cost was the order of the day at the unbelievable price of £3.50 per person, which proved to be excellent value Unfortunately; gone are the days when a military chef cooked the meal and one of your own lads behind the bar! The civilians have moved in and everything has to be paid for. Extra duty pay alone came to a little under one hundred pounds!

Fortunately, the cost was offset, by members providing a very good contribution of prizes to the raffle and a bit of "arm twisting" by the ladies selling the raffle tickets. Future lunches must be increased to £5.00 per head to cover for these charges, but it appears from canvassing, this will not deter anyone from attending! Our second lunch had to be cancelled at short notice, due to 5 Brigade deploying to the US, in the latter part of April and early May.

Entertainment for the balance of the year has yet to be decided, but we look forward to Airborne Forces weekend and the re-union in October Activity currently being considered is, the ever popular Sunday Lunch on the river Wey at Guildford and a theatre night. These type of events do cause a problem as long term booking is required and not all members can or are willing to commit that far ahead.

At one of our recent meetings, we were particularly pleased to see the reappearance of John "Tommo" Thompson. Most members know, John served as the Association Secretary for the first five years, until ill health caused him to resign. He is now well on the way to recovery after a "nightmare" eighteen months and we look forward to John playing an active part in Branch activities again! (Hopefully as Secretary!)

Our congratulations go to Mabel, wife of George Fairs, on her ninetieth birthday! Mabel has accompanied George on all the social activities organised by the Branch. Climbing in and out of a river barge on the Wey, is no mean feat for a lady half her age! This minor detail has not deterred her in any way and we hope to see her attend many more Branch functions



The Bridge at Troarn

One of many engineer tasks allotted to the Sapper Squadrons and Companies of the 6th Airborne Division, during the hours preceding the allied invasion of Normandy on the 6th June 1944, was the destruction of six bridges on the **River Dives.** This was to prevent any attempt by the Germans, to cross the river and attack the left flank of the invading forces. The task had been allocated to 3 parachute Squadron R.E. under the command of Major J.C.A. Roseveare. Infantry protection was provided by a Company from the 8th Parachute Battalion, for the targets in the south **(Bridges Bures and Troarn).** In the north **(Varavill and Robehomme)** protection was offered by the 1st Canadian Parachute Battalion. **DZ's** were allocated to each formation, to be as near their targets as possible, but in the fog, plans invariably go wrong and they did! Major Roseveare was in the leading aircraft, with plans to drop on **DZ 'K'** with the main demolition force. Needless to say, they landed on **DZ 'N,'** which was much farther away and to the North West of their target. The drop was scattered over a large area; by using Sapper initiative, they could form an adequate size of party to set out for the Bridges at Troarn and Bures.

Major Roseveare's Account

Heavily laden, we set off on the long march to our objectives. As we went, a jeep and trailer appeared out of the murk, belonging to 224 Para Field Ambulance. I had no compunction in commandeering the jeep and trailer. Lack of transport, may make all the difference between success and failure. The long pull was punishing, as some men had injuries from the drop and this did not help matters. At some cross roads we reorganized and all the medical stores were unloaded and replaced with "General Wade" charges. I split the party into two groups and sent the second group, under Captain Tim Juckes, with the bulk of Sappers to attack the bridges at **Bures.**

Without infantry protection it was evident only a "coup de main" operation against the Troarn bridge was likely to succeed. I took the wheel of the jeep and we set off. On board was Lt. David Breese, L/Sgt's. Henderson & Irving, CpI's Fellows, Knight & Wideatt, Sappers Peachey, Prince, & Moon and half a ton of explosives. It was still rather dark and gloomy and before I could stop, I ran into a barbed wire roadblock. By the "Grace of God" L/Sgt Irving had "borrowed" a pair of wire cutters from 8 Battalion to deal with telephone wires during our march. Without them, we would have got no further! Disentangling and cutting the wire, seemed to take and age and we were apprehensive as we waited! We were now entering the town and stopped just short of the crossroads. David Breese and Sgt. Irving went forward to have a look and were peering around the corner to the left, when I spotted a German with a rifle riding towards us on a bicycle! I had to shout "look the other way" and the German immediately started shouting, if he had stopped shouting and let go of his bicycle and used his rifle, he would be alive today. Because we had used a Sten Gun, instead of the preferable knife, we had to make the best possible speed through the town, as the element of surprise had been lost! We were travelling at no more than 30mph, because of the heavy load, when we came round a sharp bend and met some Germans, which resulted in a "fire fight" starting. One German set up an MG34 and as we sped on through the town and a stream of tracer bullets passed overhead. All our rifles protruded from the jeep and a large plate glass window in the town would have to be replaced.

Sapper Peachy was rear gunner on the trailer with his Bren Gun and as we drove through the town on a careering Jeep and bucking trailer, he maintained a steady all round fire! The steep gradient out of town helped our speed, but unfortunately Sapper Peachy was thrown out of the almost uncontrollable trailer and subsequently captured. On reaching the target, a "hasty" demolition was completed in seven minutes by the OC and eight men. This was instead of a planned deliberate method by thirty men, taking up to one hour to complete!

To return through the town would have been suicidal! As we had no further means of carrying out damage to the bridge and only Sten Guns for protection, we set out along a track by the river. After ditching the Jeep, we swam for several water courses before taking to the woods, eventually we came across and elderly Frenchman milking a cow! When I told him, he had been liberated, he was not impressed! Perhaps he did not understand

my accent! Finally we arrived a 3-Brigade HQ at midday, a very bedraggled and exhausted party, having been shot at by the Germans, bombed by the RAF, shelled by the Navy and unappreciated by the French!



Major Roseveare was awarded an immediate Distinguished Service Order. Three other officers were awarded the Military Cross and two NCO's received the Military Medal and all six bridges tasked, were destroyed against the odds!

Obituaries

591 (Antrim) Parachute Squadron R.E.

Arthur ("Herman") Goreing, who died in 1995 was a member of No: 1 Troop. He joined the Squadron in 1943 and served in Normandy from 'D' Day onwards, in the Ardennes and on the Rhine Crossing. His Troop Commander was Frank Harbord who was killed on the Rhine march in 1945.

Arthur was stalwart character who took great pride in his wartime service with 591 Squadron. After retirement from the Construction Industry, he was severely handicapped by emphysema but regularly attended the annual reunions of 6 Airborne Divisional Engineers in London and Normandy Pilgrimages. In spite of his failing health, he attended the D Day Anniversary Ceremonies in June 1994, where he was presented with a commemorative medal, awarded to the Normandy Veterans by the French.

He was an active member of his local branch of the PRA and joined the AEA shortly after its formation. He will be remembered for all he did to keep the Squadron spirit alive. When fifteen members of 591 Squadron met at the "Dedication Ceremony" for the memorial to Airborne Forces at Hardwick Hall in 1987, it was almost entirely due to the efforts of Arthur. He sought out former members and encouraged them to attend, an effort rewarded by the high turnout.

Arthur was a great enthusiast for all matters to do with Airborne Engineers and in particular his Squadron of 591.

He will be greatly missed by his many friends.

9 Independent Parachute Squadron R.E.

Sid Mandy passed away on Easter Sunday, after a very long and determined fight against cancer. Sid joined The Squadron in the early fifties and was with them in the Canal Zone and in Cyprus, until The Squadron returned to Aldershot in 1954. He met and married his wife Mavis in the Middle East, among doubts that the marriage would last, but it survived for forty-two years!

After The Squadron returned to Aldershot, he gained promotion to Corporal and then in 1958 was promoted to Sergeant. He played for The Squadron rugby team and was a member of winning side, when they won the Ismalia Trophy in 1959! He accompanied The Squadron to Cyprus, Jordan, Libya and Singapore, before he departed to BOAR in the early sixties. Life in Germany was not to his liking and he decided to return to civilian life, before he had completed his intended full career in the Army.

On returning to civilian life he joined the Fire Service and served with them for nineteen years. He then went into partnership in a taxi business and it was in this occupation he continued, until his death. He served on the Sports Council of Stafford and took a great interest in all types of sport, particularly Athletics. His one great wish was to stay alive until the Atlanta Olympics this year, so he could see his son Mark, represent Ireland in the High Jump for the second time. Mark has a twin brother Paul, sister Pauline and a second brother Michael.

Sid was cremated in Stafford and forty firefighters attended the funeral. The AEA was represented by Norman Penny, Reg Emberson and Bert Gregory. Our condolences go to Mavis and her family; he will be sadly missed by all his friends.

591 Squadron R.E.

Major Tony Jackson has been informed of the death of **Mr Donald Duncan**, who died on the 27th January 1996. Unfortunately, very little is known of Mr Duncan, other than he was in 3 Troop and later transferred to 3 Parachute Squadron R E A letter of condolence was sent to his widow by Major Jackson.

1st Parachute Squadron R.E.

A service of Thanksgiving for the life of Major General Eric Mackay CBE, was held in the Garrison Church Aldershot, Tuesday 19th March 1996. The congregation included not only close family, by the Mayor of Arnhem, many high ranking officers, friends from civilian and business life and a small group of Sappers who had fought with him in the school house at Arnhem. The congregation was told of his exploits in the second world war, as a Troop Commander in 1st Parachute Squadron and his zest for life. Especially anything fast, as told by his friend for over fifty years, Mr Peter Edwards. The Mayor of Arnhem Mr Paul Scholten, paid tribute to General Mackay and the British, for their resistance to an enemy when all seemed lost, and for the eventual freedom of Europe. The service was conducted by the Reverend R.A. Owen CF, assisted by the Reverend C. Gale. The Last Post and Reveille were played by a musician from the RE Band.

261 Field Park Company (Airborne) R.E.

The **Reverend Raymond Coats,** Padre to the Field Park Company during the latter part of the war years, died during April 1996. His funeral was attended by Colonel Ian Wilson MBE MC.

9 Parachute Squadron R.E.

Wilfred (Wilf) Robert Jones joined the Corps as a Darland Boy Soldier in 1939 and served continuously until 1968, where he attained the rank of WO1 His service life took to many theatres of operations, including Western Europe ('D' Day & Rhine Crossing), The Baltic, India, Palestine, Korea, Malaya and Singapore. He was mentioned in dispatches for "Gallant & distinguished Service" during his service in Malaya.

The ten medals Wilf earned were worn with great pride and he continued his public service, working in local government until his retirement. In today's world of falling standards, Wilf was a shining example, of that rare breed "A Perfect Gentleman." He will be sadly missed and our condolences go to his wife Marianne.

Wilf passed away on the 31st December 1995. His funeral was attended by the Standards from Hull Branch of the Royal Engineers Association and the Hull Branch of the Parachute Regimental Association, accompanied by members from both branches. Members of the AEA also attended.

From the Editor
